# Memorandum from the Chief Municipal Planner – Proposed Expansion to Existing Quarry – East White Hills Road (Ward 1) – Capital Ready Mix Limited.

At the regular meeting of Council on March 10, 2014 Council referred the application back to staff to provide advice on the meteorological impact of the proposed quarry expansion.

Based on the findings contained in an Odour Response Action Plan, it is felt by staff that the removal of a portion of this hill for the quarry expansion will not have a negative impact on odours in the area.

## SJMC2014-03-31/146R

It was moved by Councillor Tilley; seconded by Councillor Puddister: That an application for the proposed expansion to an existing quarry – East White Hills Road (Ward 1) by Capital Ready Mix Limited, be approved as recommended.

Discussion took place on whether the City was in receipt of a report from a meteorologist as originally recommended. As no such written report had been received the following motion was put forward:

## SJMC2014-03-31/147R

It was moved by Councillor Davis; seconded by Deputy Mayor Ellsworth: That an application for the proposed expansion to an existing quarry – East White Hills Road (Ward 1) by Capital Ready Mix Limited, be deferred pending receipt of a meteorologist's report.

## Notices Published

- a. A Discretionary Use Application has been submitted by Lester Farms Inc. to construct a greenhouse for Aquaponics and Hydroponics operations on land adjacent to 90 Pearltown Road. The proposed greenhouse has a floor area of 1,021 square metres. 'Aquaponics' is a food production system that combines Aquaculture with Hydroponics Operations. 'Hydroponic Operations' means the cultivation of plants without soil. It is proposed that artificial light will be used. (Ward 5)
- b. A Discretionary Use Application has been submitted requesting permission to occupy 310-316 Petty Harbour Road as a Home Occupation for a Fitness Studio.

The proposed business will offer fitness classes for a maximum of eight (8) students per class. It will occupy a floor area of approximately 40  $\text{m}^2$  and will operate Monday to Saturday, between 5:30 p.m. and 9 p.m., three (3) days per week. Each class is one (1) hour long, with a fifteen (15) minute break in between, with a maximum of two (2) classes per day. On-site parking is available and the applicant is the sole employee. **(Ward 5)**

- 2. The developer provide to the City's Parks Services Division an acceptable landscape design and artwork for the remaining Water Street podium and the Harbour Drive podium.

## Development Committee Report dated March 18, 2014

## 1. Approval in Principle *Proposed Gas Bar with Convenience Store, Food Service with Drive-Thru* **5 Hebron Way (Ward 1) – Commercial Regional**

## **Recommendation**

Council grant an Approval-in-Principle for the development, subject to the following conditions:

- 1. Payment of all applicable fees and assessments. The Development fee is calculated at \$20.00 per square meter of gross floor area.
- 2. Advertising of the Drive-Thru lane as this is a Discretionary Use in this zone. This will be advertised once the revised site plan has been submitted and reviewed by staff.
- 3. A Site plan is to be submitted for review and subsequent approvals. The proposed development must be designed in accordance with the City's Construction Specifications Book, the Subdivision Design Manual and the Commercial Development Policy.
- 4. Compliance with the requirements of the Planning and Development Division;
- 5. This Development must meet the minimum parking requirements for the CR Zone for this type of occupancy;
- 6. The required Building Permits must be obtained from the City, prior to the commencement of any development.

## 1. St. John's Clean & Beautiful Curbside Giveaway Program

The Committee considered a memo dated March 13, 2014 from the Manager of Waste & Recycling regarding his response to St. John's Clean & Beautiful's proposal to implement a curbside giveaway program. The main purpose of the program is waste diversion from the landfill by promoting the reuse of still useable items. They have also asked the City to fund the printing and mailing of the marketing material and ensure adequate staffing to enforce by-law 1140 and handle possible issues as they arise. The Committee was concerned about the potential for items to be left behind on sidewalks if not collected, causing a proliferation of debris from potentially hundreds of households. Enforcement would have to be put in place to ensure that residents take back inside those items that were not collected at the end of the day. The Committee, with Councillor Hickman abstaining, recommends the following:

## That the City not pursue the proposal from St. John's Clean & Beautiful to implement a curbside giveaway program.

## 2. <u>Snow Clearing Operational Review Expressions of Interest (EOI)</u>

The Committee considered a memo dated March 19, 2014 from the Deputy City Manager of Public Works requesting the Committee's consideration of a draft EOI document for a comprehensive operational review of snow clearing and fleet. The Committee on motion of Councillor Hickman; seconded by Councillor Davis, with Councillors Collins and Tilley dissenting, recommends Council's approval of the following:

That Council approve the issuance of the attached EOI document for a comprehensive review of snow clearing operations and that the study be funded from the snow clearing budget. A further recommendation for award of the study will be brought to Council for approval following receipt and evaluation of proposals.

## 3. <u>Review of Curbside Leaf Collection Pilot Program</u>

The Committee considered a memo dated March 12, 2014 from the Manager of Waste and Recycling regarding the above noted matter. The Committee on motion of Deputy Mayor Ellsworth; seconded by Councillor Davis recommends the following as outlined in greater detail in the attached memo:

That the City continue to provide the leaf mulching information to the general public and as well to continue the curbside leaf collection program as in the previous year. The Committee further recommends that the ten garbage bag limit remain as is and not be reduced as proposed. The Waste & Recycling Division will create a separate issue paper for that item in the future.

## 4. <u>Communities in Bloom Participation Request</u>

The Committee considered a memo dated March 3, 2014 from the Deputy City Manager of Public Works regarding a discussion paper prepared by Brian Head on the City's possible participation in the Communities in Bloom Challenge. The Committee on motion of Deputy Mayor Ellsworth; seconded by Councillor Davis recommends the following:

That the City consider participation in the 2015 competition and further that up to 2 City representatives attend the 2014 National Symposium & Ceremonies in PEI in September to gain a better understanding of the process and the scope of staff and financial contribution required.

## 5. <u>Shea Heights Dog Park Proposal</u>

The Committee considered a memo dated March 12, 2014 from the Deputy City Manager of Public Works regarding a proposed off-leash dog park in Shea Heights. Councillor Collins tabled a petition of support in this regard signed by 56 residents. The Committee on motion of Councillor Collins; seconded by Deputy Mayor Ellsworth recommends Council's approval of the following:

That Council proceed with the construction of an off-leash Dog Park in Shea Heights as per the attached report. Funding for the estimated \$14,000 cost is available from savings realized from existing capital works project allocations.

## 6. <u>AMEC Weather Forecasting Services Contract</u>

The Committee considered a memo dated March 18, 2014 from the Deputy City Manager of Public Works regarding the proposed extension to the City's current weather forecasting contract with AMEC. The Committee on motion of Councillor Tilley; seconded by Councillor Davis recommends Council's approval of the following:

That Council approve the proposed 4 year extension to the existing weather forecasting contract with AMEC including the amendments proposed in the attached report at a cost of \$9,950.00 per month.

## 1. <u>Fare Parity Policy – Monthly Bus Passes</u>

The Committee had previously met with representatives of Metrobus to discuss their fare parity policy and particularly their use of smart cards which can be reloaded at specific sales outlets or on-line. They charge a one-time \$5.00 fee on new m-Card activations. A hand held device used by the bus driver for charging fares is also required. The mCards as they are known, increase the capability to track rides and enable the quick downloading of data on a daily basis.

The Committee recommends Council's approval to implement the fare parity policy in line with that of Metrobus which will include the purchase of required equipment to integrate a smart card system for Go-Bus, similar to that used by Metrobus. The approximate cost to undertake this work is \$135,000 with a 10% variance on the American dollar.

## 2. <u>Accessible Transit Coordinator – Proposed Relocation</u>

Consideration is being given to the proposed relocation of the Accessible Transit Coordinator to the new office at the St. John's Transportation Commission (Metrobus). Prior to a decision being made, a logistical review will have to be undertaken to consider the extent of administrative and accessibility supports that would be available at the new location to determine if it is the best fit for the Accessible Transit Coordinator and the clientele serviced.

The Committee recommends that the Deputy Mayor, being both a representative of the St. John's Transportation Commission and the Para Transit Advisory Committee, undertake a logistical review for the proposed relocation of the Accessible Transit Coordinator to the offices of the St. John's Transportation Commission. The purpose is to determine the viability of such a move and to provide a written report back to the Committee with proposed recommendations.

Northern Property REIT has submitted an application to rezone vacant, undeveloped property at 150 Stavanger Drive from the Commercial Regional (CR) Zone to the Apartment Medium Density (A2) Zone. This is to allow development of a 4-storey, 71-unit apartment building. The requested rezoning will require an amendment to the St. John's Municipal Plan.

At the Regular Meeting of Council held on October 28, 2013, Council agreed with the recommendation of the Planning and Development Committee that Northern Property REIT should be asked to undertake a Land Use Assessment Report (LUAR), at its expense, regarding the application to rezone the property. Council further agreed that upon submission of the LUAR and review of the report by City staff, that the rezoning application will be advertised for public review and comment in accordance with the public notification requirements of the St. John's Development Regulations. It will then be referred to a Regular Meeting of Council for initial consideration.

On March 6, 2014 a draft LUAR document was received from the applicant. It was reviewed and found to satisfy the Terms of Reference which had been approved by Council and acceptable for public review and comment before referral to Council.

The application and LUAR have been advertised in The Telegram newspaper and posted on the City website. In addition, notices have mailed to property owners located within a minimum radius of 150 metres from the application site advising that the application and LUAR are to be referred for a decision by Council at the Regular Meeting of Council scheduled for April 7, 2014.

Two submissions were received by the Office of the City Clerk. The concerns raised were, for the most part, covered by the applicant's LUAR. One thing which was not that the applicant has been asked to address concerns the dense planting of trees which the applicant intends to plant as a buffer on privately owned land located between the subject property and lands to the east which have frontage on Stanford Place. Another thing raised that is outside of the scope of the LUAR is the management of traffic on Stavanger Drive.

## RECOMMENDATION

Council should now determine if it wishes to move ahead with the amendment process. The Department of Planning, Development and Engineering recommends that Council approve the LUAR (with the requirement that the landscaping plan be revised to show a planting of coniferous or a 50/50 mix of deciduous and coniferous trees on the land between 150 Stavanger Drive and Stanford Place) and proceed with the amendment process.

If Council determines that it wishes to move ahead with the amendments, Council should adoptin-principle the amendments. City staff will proceed to forward the amendments to the Municipal Plan and Development Regulations to the Department of Municipal Affairs with the request for the issuance of a Provincial release for the amendments. Upon the issuance of the Provincial release, the amendments will then be referred to a Regular Meeting of Council for consideration of adoption and the appointment of an independent commissioner to conduct a public hearing on the amendments.

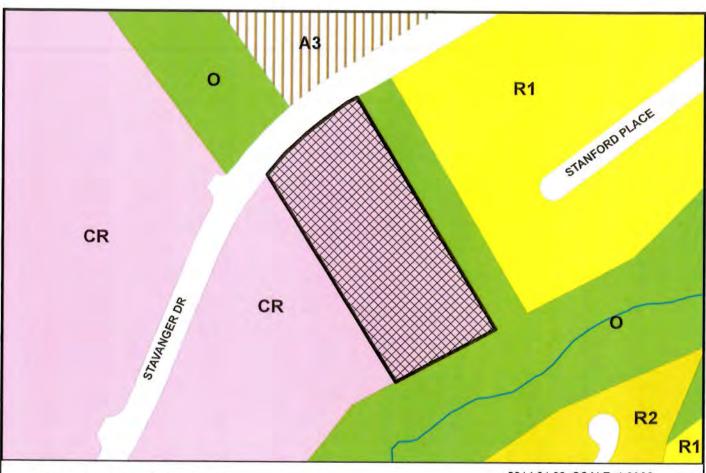

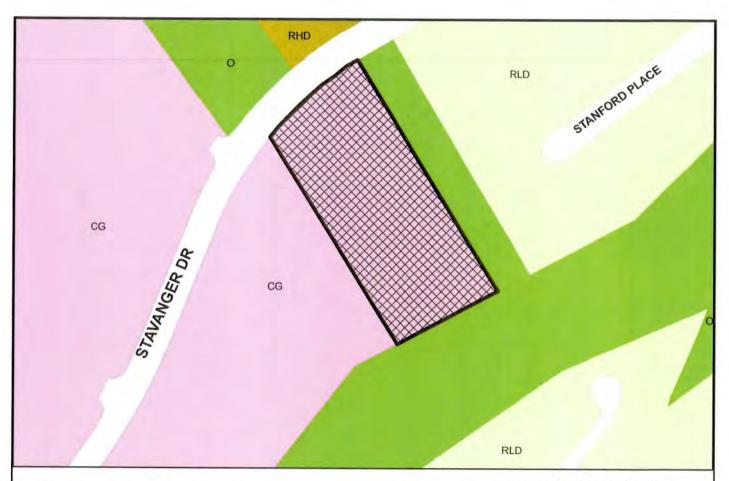

## 1. Homelessness Partnering Strategy

The Committee considered a memo dated March 20, 2014 from the Deputy City Manager of Community Services regarding the above noted matter. The St. John's Community Advisory Committee on Homelessness will convene a Community Planning Forum on May 26-27, 2014 at City Hall to engage stakeholders and complete the 2014-2019 St. John's Community Plan to Reduce Homelessness. This plan will enable the incorporation of a Housing First Strategy to reduce homelessness within our City utilizing \$3.5 million in Federal Homelessness Partner Strategy (HPS) funding. St. John's is the only designated HPS community in Newfoundland and Labrador to receive these funds.

The Committee on motion of Councillor Galgay; seconded by Councillor Tilley: recommends that the City provide a grant of \$5,750 to offset the shortfall for the Community Planning Forum. This planning forum is vital to the future of the City's Homelessness Partnering Strategy for the next five-year period, resulting in an investment in the City of St. John's of \$3.5 million. There is additional funding available in the Community Grants budget for 2014 to cover this cost.

## 2. Bannerman Park Pool/Pool House Re-Opening

The Committee was advised that as a result of construction delays, the Bannerman Park Pool and Pool House will not be completed until September, 2014, and therefore, will not be a re-opening for the summer season this year. Staff advised that accommodations will be made to facilitate the anticipated increase in users at the Bowring Park pool, i.e. the addition of lessons. It should be noted that the City's outdoor pools when open are free of charge.

## 3. St. Paul's School Funding Request

The Committee considered a memo dated March 20, 2014 from the Director of Recreation regarding a request from St. Paul's School for financial support for the development of a community Multi-Purpose Track and Field Facility. The project cost is estimated to be \$1 million with \$350,000 already secured through in-kind and cash. Mr. Derek Staubitzer representing St. Paul's School advised that all engineering drawings have been completed and it is their hope to commence construction in 2014. The request for the City is to contribute 1/3 of the project to a maximum of \$350,000. The City was also advised by Mr. Staubitzer that the Minister of Municipal Affairs has agreed to match the City's contribution. The City, however, has concerns about the matching contribution from the Province being taken from the Province's capital budget allocation, resulting in a loss of funds for other capital projects.

The Recreation and Parks Master Plan does support partnership opportunities with the English School District. It should be noted that while the City of St. John's does not currently have an outdoor Athletics Track and Field Complex within its inventory of sport facilities, this proposed facility does not meet standard regulations for track and field to play host to sanctioned events including Canada Games. If the City of St. John's were to be awarded the hosting of the 2021 Canada Games, an investment in a regulation size Athletics Complex would rank higher on the priority list.

The Committee on motion of Councillor Galgay; seconded by Councillor Collins: recommends that Council defer consideration of this request pending further information with respect to land ownership and whether or not the Province's allocation of funds will result in the loss of funds to other capital projects.

## City of St. John's Heritage Advisory Committee Terms of Reference (updated March 28<sup>th</sup>)

## Purpose

The Heritage Advisory Committee provides advice and recommendations to the St. John's Municipal Council on heritage issues that affect the City. The Committee is primarily involved in built heritage but may offer advice on intangible cultural heritage, industrial heritage, and other aspects of heritage and its place in the fabric of our community. The Committee provides a key communication and working link between Council and the community. Issues may be referred to it by members themselves, the community, Council or committees of Council.

## **Responsibilities and Duties**

The Heritage Advisory Committee shall be responsible for:

- 1. Advising and making recommendations to Council in a manner that will be supportive of the mandates of various departments with the assistance of staff, concerning but not limited to the following areas:
  - a. Any heritage issues, including issues under the City of St. John's Act or the Historic Resources Act of Newfoundland and Labrador that may be referred to it by Council.
  - b. The designation of any area as a heritage Area, or any change to a designated Heritage Area.
  - c. The designation of any building as a Heritage building.
  - d. The designation of cultural landscapes.
  - e. The commemoration of historic events, persons and places.
- 2. Providing a key communication and working link between Council and the community on matters relevant to heritage within the City limits. This includes reviewing and making recommendations on heritage matters regarding the federal and provincial governments relevant to the City of St. John's.
- 3. Preparing, with the assistance of staff, an annual report to Council on the Committee's activities and achievements for the preceding year, and an outline of its goals and objectives for the coming year.
- 4. Advising on ways to increase the public awareness of and commitment to issues related to heritage.
- 5. Providing support and advice to the City's Heritage Officer and other staff as needed.
- 6. Carrying out other tasks as may be approved or requested by Council.

When necessary, the Heritage Advisory Committee may strike a subcommittee to deal with issues that may arise. Recruitment and selection of subcommittee members is at the discretion of the Committee.

## Composition/Membership

The Committee will consist of up to twelve (12) members comprising:

- 1. At least two representatives of Council, one of whom shall be appointed by Council as the Chair;
- 2. Group representation from the following organizations, each of which may also nominate an alternate:
  - a. Downtown St. John's Inc.
  - b. NL Association of Architects
  - c. Heritage Foundation of NL
  - d. Newfoundland Historic Trust
  - e. Canadian Home Builders Association NL
  - f. Atlantic Planners' Institute
- 3. At least two (2) residents of the City appointed by Council, at least one of whom who shall be between the ages of 18 and 35.
- 4. Staff support and advice will be provided by the Chief Municipal Planner and/or alternate, the Director of Planning & Development, the Heritage Officer, the City Archivist, the Tourism Industry Coordinator and administrative support will be provided by the Office of the City Clerk.
- 5. Other groups or organizations may be asked on occasion to nominate a representative on a temporary or permanent basis, as the Committee and Council deems necessary or appropriate.

Appointments to the Committee shall be made by Council at a Regular Meeting.

The term of membership is four (4) years, with the option for organizational representatives to be recommended by their respective boards for reappointment as each organization sees fit.

Attendance at scheduled meetings of the HAC is expected. Members unable to attend a scheduled meeting shall inform the Committee Recording Secretary as soon as possible. A member missing three (3) consecutive meetings without cause shall be deemed to have resigned or forfeited his/her membership, unless the absence is approved by the HAC or determined otherwise by the Committee.

## **Conflict of Interest and Confidentiality**

- 1. In cases where the Committee agenda or Committee discussions present a conflict of interest for a member, that member is required to declare such conflict, to abstain from discussion, and to remove himself/herself from the meeting room until the agenda item has been dealt with by the Committee.
- 2. (Definition) Conflict of Interest occurs when a Committee member participates in discussion or decision-making about a matter which may financially benefit that member or a member of his/her family, or someone with whom the Committee member has a close personal relationship, directly or indirectly, regardless of the size of the benefit.
- 3. All Committee members are required to refrain from the use or transmission of any confidential or privileged information while serving with the Heritage Advisory Committee.

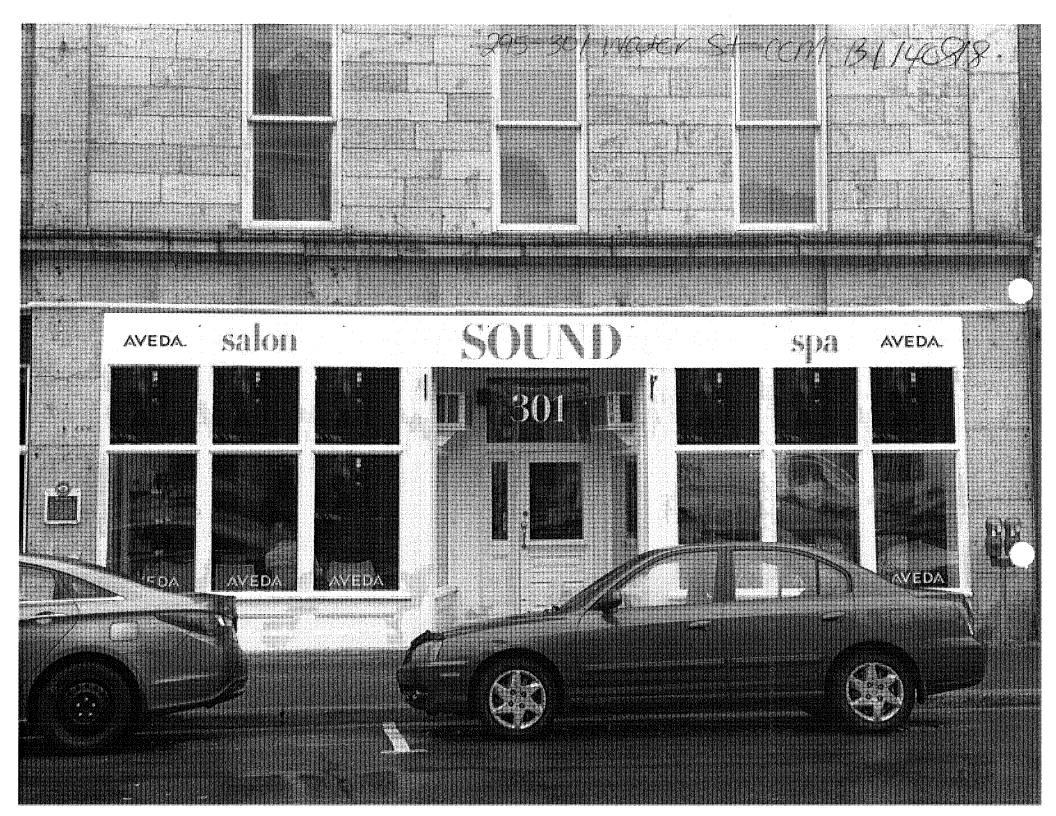






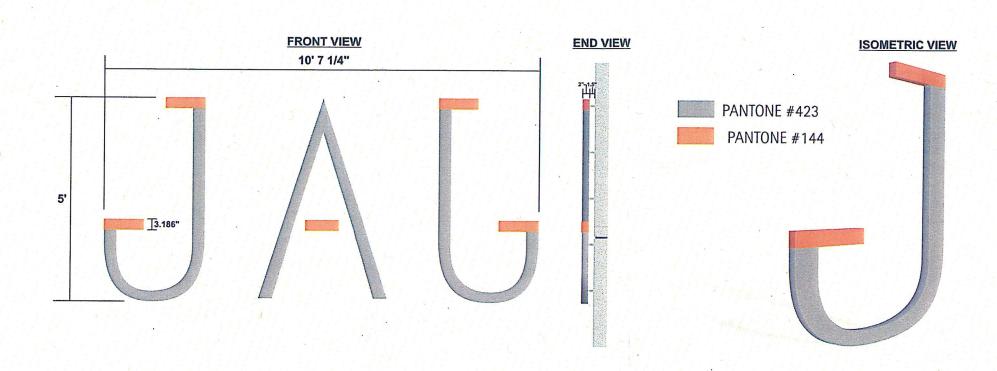
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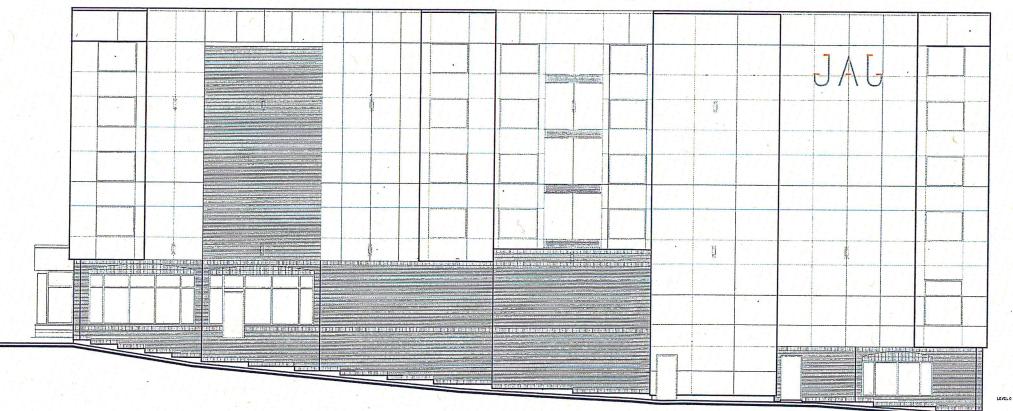




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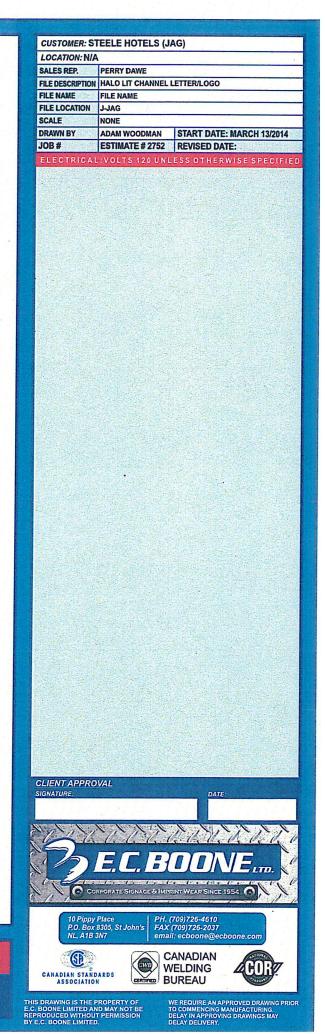

The most recent assessment of the condition of the bridge structure at Pearltown Road (over South Brook) has determined, through both visual observations and core sampling of the bridge deck structure, that the bridge is beyond normal rehabilitation. It is recommended that this bridge structure be replaced in 2014.

Preliminary estimates to replace the bridge are in the order of magnitude of \$500,000. The project could be funded through any realized savings on the Bridge Rehabilitation Program, with the balance funded through Gas Tax monies.

In addition, as this project arose out of the design and tendering for the Bridge Rehabilitation Program, in accordance with Item 3.4 of the policy for the "Hiring of External Consultants" it is recommended that Nova Consultants Inc, be retained as the consulting engineer for this bridge replacement project.

## **BUSINESS BRIEFS**

#### **Investments in Venture Capital**

The Government of NL recently announced, in Budget 2014, that it will invest \$10 million in a Build Ventures Fund which will provide support to innovative start-up businesses, and will expand opportunities for early-stage businesses in the province with high potential for growth. The privately-managed venture capital initiative will provide financing, as well as access to necessary mentoring and business expertise, to ensure companies have the resources to succeed in national and international markets. The provincial government is collaborating with the Governement of Canada

and other Atlantic provinces, as well as private investors, on the \$60-million venture capital fund. A new Venture NL Fund is also under development.

# Subsea 7 Wins Hebron Field Contract

UK-based oilfield services firm Subsea 7 has been awarded a \$75-million, three-year subsea construction services contract by ExxonMobil Canada Properties. The deal will see Subsea 7 support the Hebron heavy oil field development, located in the Jeanne d'Arc Basin some 220 miles southeast of St. John's. The firm will provide project management and engineering to the project, as well as install two offshore loading systems in a water depth of 300 ft. Engineering and project management will start immediately from its offices in St John's.

#### Canadian North announces St. John's-Halifax-Iqaluit flight service

Canadian North will begin flying directly between Iqaluit and Halifax, with same-plane service to St John's starting June 20. Canadian North will operate the route for three months with the possibility of an extension if the route is successful.

### **Upper Storey Fire Safety Report Released**

A new report and guidelines commissioned by the City of St. John's to address upper storey development in Downtown St. John's means cost-effective building upgrades are possible for upper storey properties, while ensuring life safety standards are met and the historic integrity of the properties is not compromised.

As part of the process, report consultants R.J. Bartlett Engineering, Ltd. used a three-storey property on Queen's Road as a case study. Working with the owner of Soothe Downtown Spa, the consultant was able to demonstrate a way to renovate the space while maintaining the historic integrity of the building and identifying an effective fire safety plan.

Roadmap 2021, the City's ten-year strategic economic plan, recognizes the importance of facilitating the development of underutilized space in the downtown as a means of increasing occupancy, encouraging density and adding to the vitality of the city.
