Food and drink sales increase year over year in province

Sales in the food services and drinking places subsector rose 6.31% to \$76.56 million from October 2014 to October 2015 in Newfoundland and Labrador. Nationally, sales increased 4.0% to \$5.1 billion. According to Statistics Canada, restaurant sales were up in eight provinces in October and decreased in Alberta and Quebec. (Source: CANSIM table 355-0006).

St. John's ranks 4th on new GreenScore City Index

GreenScore Canada Limited, a Canadian non-profit foundation working towards economic and environmental harmony, has developed an eco-index that lets you know how eco-friendly your city is at a glance. The City of St. John's ranked fourth

out of 20 Canadian cities in the Small Cities category.

The primary objective of the GreenScore City Index is to measure the ecological impact cities exert on the biosphere. The index is adapted from the United Nations circle of sustainability initiative; however, the score results are measured from natures prospective allowing it to accurately reflect city eco-footprints. The 2016 edition establishes baseline scores for each city. GreenScore will use the baseline numbers in future scores to measure the footprint pressure each city exerts on the biosphere.

Hire a Student: Funding Available

Under the Canada Summer Jobs program, Service Canada and partner departments provide funding to help employers create summer job opportunities for students. The program is designed to focus on local priorities, while helping both students and their communities. Canada Summer Jobs provides funding to notfor-profit organizations, public-sector employers and small businesses with 50 or fewer employees create summer job opportunities for young people aged 15 to 30 years who are full-time students intending to return to their studies in the next school year. Business and Development Activity 2015

In 2015, the City of St. John's approved 145 new businesses, 43 of those were homebased. In 2014, 162 new businesses were approved. In addition, the City recorded more than \$237 million in building permits, a decrease of 41% over 2014. The value of commercial building permits decreased 25% to almost \$132 million in 2015 compared to the previous year. Some of the major construction projects approved in 2015 included:

Economic Review 2015: Changing Economic Conditions

The City of St. John's recently released Economic Review 2015. The report notes that the St. John's Census Metropolitan Area (CMA) recorded tepid economic performance in 2015. Household income recorded an increase of 2.9%, and the unemployment rate increased slightly to 6.5% in 2015, up 0.5 percentage points over 2014. Real gross domestic product (GDP) declined by 2.5%. Retail trade in 2015 was on par with 2014, and housing starts declined in 2015 by 19.9%. The Consumer Price Index, an indicator of changes in consumer prices, increased 0.4 percentage points in 2015. Survey of Household Spending 2014

Newfoundland and Labrador (NL) households spent an average of \$57,717 on goods and services in 2014, up from \$55,576 in 2013. The proportion of household spending dedicated to transportation* was highest in NL, at 23.9% while transportation costs made up the smallest share of household spending in British Columbia (18.9%). Spending on shelter in NL accounted for 22.7% of total spending, the smallest proportion among the provinces. Nationally, the proportion of household spending dedicated to shelter was 29.1%. On average, NL households spent \$8,489 on food in 2014, accounting for 14.7% of their total spending on goods and services. NL households spent an average of \$6,606 on food purchased from stores, and an average of \$1,883 on food purchased from restaurants. NL households spent an average of \$3,664 on clothing and accessories, or 6.3% of their total consumption.

St. John's-area population grew by 1.0% to last July

The St. John's census metropolitan area (CMA) population grew by 1.0% (2,028 people) to 214,300 between July 1, 2015 and June 30, 2015, according to a new Statistics Canada population estimate. Nationally, the growth rate was 0.9% in 2014-2015. A population decrease was recorded in the non-CMA part of Newfoundland and Labrador (-1.1%). In the St. John's CMA, the proportion of children aged 0 to 14 (15.1%) remained higher than the proportion of people aged 65 and older (13.8%). The median age of the St. John's CMA population increased over the past decade, from 37.6 years to 39.1 years in 2015 (+1.5 years). www.statcan.gc.ca

2017 Operating Budget Guidelines Investing in Tomorrow

The City is taking a comprehensive approach for building Budget 2017. The Operating Budget for 2017 will be "program/service level-oriented". The budget focuses on the delivery of prescribed services in terms of service levels and expenditure limits set by



Council. Programs and service levels are defined within the parameters of what service is provided, to whom and why, sources of funding, staffing, and the ability to measure performance/outcomes. Targets have been identified reflecting Council's objectives with respect to mill rate reductions, expenditure and staffing controls, and enhanced capital expenditures. With 2017 being year two of the 2016-2018 Three Year Operating Budget, no expenditure increases from the original budget submission will be accepted. St. John's ranks 10th within the 17 featured cities in Canada - KPMG's Competitive Alternatives Study

KPMG's 2016 Competitive Alternatives study provides an independent comparison of international business locations in more than 100 cities in 10 countries around the world. It explores the most significant business cost factors and measures and provides insight on the impact of 26 key cost components, across 7 business to business service segments and 12 significant manufacturing sectors. The study informs readers about business costs which include things such as labour costs, transportation, utilities, taxes, or facilities (leasing costs) as they compare to other cities. Within the 17 featured cities in Canada, St. John's ranks 10th. This is an improvement over the 2014 ranking. St. John's ranks 12th among all 111 featured cities. While St. John's has experienced a slowdown in economic activity, a higher US dollar offers some cost

competitiveness and cost advantages. According to the study released in March 2016, St. John's now has the lowest effective corporate income tax rate among all 111 cities in this study. An important aspect of this report relates to St. John's prominent Research and Development (R&D) cluster in oceanographic research. St. John's scored highly in this category (ranks 13th out of the 111 cities internationally) for R&D services, and offers some of the lowest business costs among cities in Canada and the US in this area. City of St. John's and Partners to Build Community Market

The proposed plan for a new community market at the former Metrobus location on Freshwater Road is moving forward. The City is contributing \$2 million through its capital

budget, close to \$1.17 million is coming from the Atlantic Canada Opportunities Agency (ACOA), and \$490,000 is from the Government of Newfoundland and Labrador's Department of Business, Tourism, Culture and Rural Development (BTCRD). The St. John's Farmers' Market Cooperative (SJFM) will operate the facility and have also contributed \$100,000 towards the project. The completion of a feasibility assessment and business plan determined that a market is viable and financially sustainable in the proposed facility. In addition to the market the community facility will be equipped with a kitchen and meeting area. The City's Economic Roadmap 2021 specifically identified the community market as an action item and points to its value in creating a desirable city for newcomers and young professionals. A request for proposals for the building's design will be issued with construction slated to begin in 2017 for a grand opening in 2018.



New Option Being Considered for Water Street Infrastructure Work

City staff have been exploring the possibility of how best and least disruptively to replace water and sewer lines along Water Street from Waldegrave Street to Job's Cove. Based on input from downtown stakeholders and continued research, the City will now investigate the feasibility of using trenchless technology. The exploratory work will include:

- Cleaning the existing combined sewer beginning in spring 2016
- Videoing the combined sewer and determining suitability for lining
- Confirming the capacity of the existing watermain

Once this exploratory work is complete, staff will report back to Council with a recommendation as to whether or not this is a viable option to pursue. If viable, the project will proceed as planned in 2017 using this approach.

NL Technology Sector Valued at \$1.6-Billion

According to the Newfoundland and Labrador Association of Technology Industries (nati) the technology sector generates \$1.6 billion in annual revenue in the province and is bigger in terms of annual revenue than either the fishery or tourism industries. The technology sector employs 4,000 people and includes the information technology, ocean technology, the green economy and servicing of the oil and gas industry. Nati is working to double the size of the sector utilizing the \$513,000 it received in funding recently from the Atlantic Canada Opportunities Agency (ACOA). The new funding will be provided in two separate injections, \$332,000 will be provided to help with the development and launch of a Commercialization Officer Internship and Directed Research Program; \$181,000, will go to the core operations of NATI, to help deliver

"innovation programming" in 2016, bringing industry companies together and developing export market opportunities.

\$6.5 Billion in Major Project Spending Planned for NL

Investment in major projects in Atlantic Canada is forecasted at \$12.8 billion this year, about half of that will be spent in Newfoundland and Labrador (NL). The Atlantic Provinces Economic Council (APEC) released its Major Projects inventory on June 6. The inventory, which includes all projects valued at \$25 million or more (\$10 million or more in PEI), estimates \$6.5 billion in major project investment in NL in 2016, down 14% from a year ago. Most of the decline this year is due to the winding down of the construction phase of the Hebron project and lower spending on other offshore projects. APEC is forecasting an overall decline in 2017, though there is potential for improvement if certain projects move ahead. Federal stimulus spending and Vale's nickel mine in Labrador will support investment in 2017, and increasing offshore exploration and mining activity could bring investment back into positive territory.

City of St. John's supports Youth Ventures

Thinking about creating your own summer job but don't know where to start? Youth Ventures is a free program for students aged 12-29 in Newfoundland and Labrador. 

Newfoundland and Labrador exports set to rebound in 2017

Newfoundland and Labrador will see Canada's most dramatic turnaround in export performance from this year to next, according to Export Development Canada's (EDC) semi-annual Global Export Forecast. Challenges in the energy sector, particularly weak commodity prices, are the primary force driving the province's exports down 11 per cent in 2016. However, the province's exports are expected to rebound strongly with 18 per cent growth in 2017. The long-term outlook is promising, as the exploration and development efforts initiated a few years ago will soon come to fruition. In particular the Hebron oil field, one of the largest capital investments in the province, is on track to pump its first oil by the end of 2017. www.edc.ca

Immigration, business ownership and employment in Canada, 2001 to 2010

Immigrants who have been in Canada for more than 10 years have higher rates of private incorporated business ownership than individuals born in Canada. However, the types of businesses owned by immigrants tend to employ fewer paid workers than those owned by individuals born in Canada, according to a recent Statistics Canada study. Of all immigrantowned private incorporated businesses, 45% were located in four industries: professional, scientific and technical services; retail trade; accommodation and food services; and transportation and warehousing. The rate of unincorporated self-employment was also higher among longer-term immigrants (22%) than among individuals born in Canada (16%).

The first-ever Canada-Newfoundland and Labrador Immigration Agreement was signed in July. The agreement formalizes and builds on the existing collaborative relationship between Canada and Newfoundland and Labrador on immigration matters, including the Provincial Nominee Program - the provincially driven program that fast-tracks identified individuals with job offers to permanent residency. An immigration pilot project for Atlantic Canada was also announced allowing up to 2,000 additional immigrants and their families in to the Atlantic region each year for three years. Newfoundland and Labrador has been experiencing growth in immigration. In 2015, Newfoundland and Labrador welcomed over 1,100 new permanent residents, a new record.

St. John's Economic Outlook 2016

Economic Outlook 2016 reports that economic growth in the St. John's Census Metropolitan Area (CMA) is expected to increase marginally this year, with real gross domestic product (GDP) expected to increase by 0.7%. Retail sales are expected to grow by 1.4% to reach \$4.0 billion this year. Housing starts throughout 2016 are expected to decline by 25% to 739 units. The unemployment rate is expected to increase to 6.9%, compared to 6.5% in 2015. The population of the St. John's CMA is estimated to grow to 216,800 persons, an increase of 1.2% compared to 2015. The demographics of the region









have changed significantly over the past 30 years, and persons 55 years and over account for a larger percentage of the population. The report also discusses labour market activity among older workers, as they now account for larger shares of the labour force and employment. Potential 25 billion barrels of oil in Orphan Basin

The offshore exploration of Newfoundland and Labrador (NL) continues. Nalcor is doing \$34 million in seismic work this year for resource estimates to attract oil companies. In August, the provincial government released a resource assessment that suggests there are potentially 25.5 billion barrels of oil in the West Orphan Basin, compared to the 12.5 billion barrels the Flemish Pass is believed to hold. The 2016 assessment adds growing knowledge about NL's offshore oil and gas potential, leading to more exploration work by global companies ensuring a thriving oil and gas industry for years to come. The provincial government hopes the study will attract even more investment than the Flemish Pass, which garnered \$1.2 billion in bids last year.

The bid round on the Orphan Basin closes Nov. 9, 2016.

St. John's office market overview

The overall vacancy rate increased 2.3% to 13.9% in the second quarter of 2016 compared to a year ago. The average asking rent (rental rates reflect gross asking rate per sq. ft./yr) increased 1% to \$35.14 as of the second quarter of 2016. Currently, 186,600 sq. ft. of office space is under construction in the St. John's metro area. Cushman & Wakefield Atlantic expect office vacancy rates to rise and tenants to be more aggressive in their negotiation of leases and/or renewals.

\$3M funding from Silicon Valley firm for St. John's company Sequence Bio

Sequence Bio, a data-driven company that is leading a 100,000 person genome sequencing project, received a \$3-million commitment from U.S.-based Data Collective Venture Capital. Sequence Bio says they're the first in Atlantic Canada to receive an investment from Silicon Valley. Their aim is to use data collected from the people of Newfoundland and Labrador to improve how diseases are diagnosed and treated. The company wants to become a player in early-stage pharmaceutical development and must next prove concept for advanced approach to drug development. The local company has about a dozen employees and is hoping to double in size by the end of the year.

CMA Year-to-date housing starts

Housing starts in St. John's Census Metropolitan Area (CMA) for 2016 were trending at 744 units in August compared to 669 in July according to Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation. The trend is a six month moving average of the monthly seasonally adjusted annual rates of housing starts. The trend measure in housing starts was higher in August in the St. John's CMA, driven by an increase in row and duplex construction within the multiple starts segment. In terms of actual housing starts, there have been 497 in the St. John's CMA from January to August 2016, compared to 630 for the same time frame in 2015. www.cmhc.ca

While it builds its own network on the island, residents of St John's that sign up for wireless service with Eastlink will be able to roam on Bell Aliant's network free of charge when they're outside of the city.

Landlord survey on affordable housing opportunities now online

The City of St. John's is coordinating a survey of landlords in partnership with the Rental Team of the Affordable Housing Working Group. The City cannot tackle the issue of affordable housing alone; addressing this issue will require a collective effort from all levels of government as well as from private and community partners. A key strategy of the City's Affordable Housing Business Plan is to cultivate a base of landlords willing to rent to individuals seeking affordable housing, including those who may require supports. All landlords and property managers with rental property in St. John's are encouraged to visit **engagestjohns.ca** page to take the survey which addresses barriers, obstacles and opportunities of achieving a successful tenancy. For the purposes of the survey a 'landlord' is anyone who receives payments to have individuals reside at a property they own or manage. The short survey takes approximately 10 minutes to complete and participants can choose to be entered in a random draw for a \$500 home improvement gift card. The survey is open until October 17.

Transocean awarded drilling contract

A new 15-month drilling contract in the Newfoundland offshore has been issued by Suncor Energy to drilling contractor Transocean Ltd. The *Transocean Barents*, a harsh-environment ultra-deepwater rig, is expected to begin operations in the offshore in late 2017. According to Transocean, the contract has a day rate of \$260,000 (\$119 million estimated backlog added, excluding mobilization). Suncor's current growth capital expenditures offshore Canada include development drilling activities at Hibernia and White Rose.

NL poised to lead country in export growth next year

Export Development Canada (EDC) says Newfoundland and Labrador (NL) will lead the country in export growth in 2017. EDC's forecast predicts that the improvement in the outlook for metals and ores exports will be driven by stronger shipments than expected because of investments coming online after prolonged delays. The province's exports in mining output and higher oil prices are expected to completely offset the drop this year in exports. The result will be a 12% increase in NL's exports in 2017, which will be the best provincial export performance in Canada.

St. John's area rental market report

Demand for rental accommodations in the St. John's area declined in 2016, driven by economic weakness and an increase in the supply of newly completed apartments. According to the results of Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation's Rental Market Survey conducted in October 2016, the vacancy rate increased to 7.9% compared to 4.7% in October 2015 in the St. John's area. The overall average rent in the St. John's area for a twobedroom apartment was \$958 up 1.3% compared to October 2015. The number of private apartment units increased to 3,815 during the survey period up from 3,654 units in 2015.
