Business Briefs



St. John's CMA will have the fastest economic growth in 2019

The latest figures released from the Conference Board of Canada's <u>Metropolitan Outlook II</u> report indicate that an increase in offshore oil production will boost output in the primary and utilities sector in St. John's in 2019; real GDP will expand by 4.0%—the fastest growth of any major Canadian metropolitan area. The outlook report provides detailed economic insights for 16 Canadian Metropolitan Area (CMA) economies. Canada is projected to have more moderate economic growth of 1.4% in 2019 despite one of the strongest jobs gains on record.

Sequence Bio launches the NL Genome Project

St. John's based Sequence Bio has launched a large-scale genomics project studying Newfoundland's unique genetic makeup to help it find treatments for common diseases that impact Newfoundland and Labrador the most. Sequence Bio is calling for 2,500 volunteers so they can collect saliva and examine medical records of participants to generate and create data needed to do their research. The technology is so advanced that from just two milliliters of saliva, they can generate someone's full genome. The goal is to launch a bigger study, but they first need to take the findings from the 2,500-participant pilot before rolling out the bigger study. St. John's: Low degree of housing vulnerability

According to <u>CMHC</u>, an overall low degree of housing market vulnerability is maintained for the St. John's housing market. Despite improving employment levels and gains in the inflation-adjusted personal disposable income, housing demand remains lackluster, affected by muted population growth. This has resulted in fewer sales, higher listings and flat price growth, therefore keeping the overheating, price acceleration and overvaluation below levels of concern. Moderate evidence of overbuilding continues to be observed in St. John's. An upward trend in the number of completed and unsold units remains, as demand is stagnant for higher-priced new home construction units and interprovincial out-migration impacts population growth.



City Building Permits (year to date)

As of August 5, 2019 the value of:

- Commercial permits were down -47% from \$139,068,008 in 2018 to \$74,136,794 in 2019
- Industrial permits were valued at \$5,000 for 2018 and \$3,000 for 2019
- Government/Institutional permits were down from \$2,445,882 in 2018 to \$1,577,350 in 2019*
- Residential permits were down -47% to \$23,684,917 for 2019 over \$44,406,991 for 2018
- Repair permits were down -21%, from \$1,609,960 in 2018 to \$1,604,906 in 2019
- Total value of all permits was down -46% to \$101,006,967 for 2019 over \$187,535,841 for 2018
