Memorial University Adds \$627 million Yearly to NL Economy

A new report from KPMG confirms that Memorial University is a significant contributor to the local, provincial and national economy. Memorial **adds approximately \$627 million** to Newfoundland and Labrador's economy each year and supports 9,922 jobs throughout the province. The <u>study</u> considered the impact of spending by the university itself, employee and student spending, the impact of visitors to Memorial and the ripple effect of additional income earned by alumni due to their Memorial degrees. According to President Vianne Timmons, *"Memorial creates jobs, supports local businesses, educates knowledgeable graduates, and fosters innovation and entrepreneurship that will continue to help the economy grow and diversify."*

NLOWE's New Mentorship Program

A big part of starting a new business is learning the path to success. A new mentorship program for women entrepreneurs hopes to do just that. The Newfoundland and Labrador Organization of Women Entrepreneurs (NLOWE) has launched a mentorship program to help women entrepreneurs focus on business and professional development. Restaurant Sales Increase in NL

The latest Food Services and Drinking Places <u>survey</u> from Statistics Canada indicates unadjusted sales in the food service and drinking places subsector increased (+21.02%) to \$76.4 million in September 2021 compared to September 2020 in Newfoundland and Labrador. The figures cover gross sales, not profit. Further information is available in the Food Services and Drinking Places Sales <u>dashboard</u>, where users can consult data on sales in food services and drinking places for Canada and by province.

TaskforceNL Challenge to Business Leaders

City Building Permits

November 29, 2021

Commercial permits were down -12% from \$134,593,577.71 in 2020 to \$117,929,292.82 in 2021

Industrial permits were valued at \$3,000.00 for 2020 and \$4,164,500.00 for 2021

Government/Institutional permits were up \$677,431.00 in 2020 to \$33,219,907.00 in 2021*

Residential permits were up 27% to \$58,465,944.50 for 2021 over \$46,064,939.79 for 2020

Repair permits were up 29% from \$3,264,510.90 in 2020 \$4,213,580.57 in 2021

Total value of all permits was **up 18%** to \$217,993,224.89 for 2021 over \$\$184,603,459.40 for 2020

*Note that this data does not include the full range of permit activity undertaken by the provincial government and Memorial University.
