St. John's real estate market

The overall **office vacancy rate** dropped by 90 basis points during the fourth quarter of 2021, to a rate of 20.3% according to a recent <u>report</u> from Cushman Wakefield Atlantic. The Downtown submarket saw its vacancy increase to 32.1% in the fourth quarter of 2021, up 50 bps from the previous quarter. Overall, average net rents in the St. John's office market were unchanged across all submarkets for the fourth quarter of 2021 and sit at \$20.94 per square foot (psf), with the Downtown submarket at \$24.25 psf.

The overall **industrial vacancy rate** was up by 60 basis points to 12.9% in the fourth quarter of 2021 compared to the previous quarter. The St. John's industrial market saw overall average net rents remain unchanged from the previous quarter, as rates currently sit at \$12.03 per square foot.

New housing starts in the St. John's metro area increased over 30% to 544 units in 2021 up from 418 starts in 2020. The average absorbed price of a new single-detached house rose 6.7% to \$384, 530, according to <u>CMHC</u>. Residential resale activity in St. John's was up by 7.6% on a year-over-year basis in December. The overall MLS® HPI composite benchmark price for homes in St. John's was \$292,000 in December 2021, up by 9.4% compared to December 2020 according to the <u>Newfoundland and Labrador Association of REALTORS</u>.

Tourism and art sector funding

The Government of Newfoundland and Labrador is rolling out two new programs geared towards artists and the hospitality industry impacted by the sharp decline in business or professional opportunities between October 1, 2021 and February 28, 2022. More than \$7 million is available for the Tourism and Hospitality Support Program, and \$2 million is available for the





Artist Support Program. Qualifying artists will receive a one-time payment of \$3,000 to compensate for lost revenue and opportunities. Eligibility criteria for the Tourism and Hospitality Support Program has expanded to include audio/visual companies, caterers, performance spaces and privately-owned venues. Both programs will open in mid-February and close on March 15. Detailed program information and applications are available here.
