Rennie's River East Traffic Pattern Review "What we heard" Report

Public Engagement Process

April-May 2018



- Feedback received regarding the traffic calming no-entry restriction on Winter Avenue at King's Bridge Road identified larger scale frustration with restricted turning movements in the area of Rennie's River between Portugal Cove Road and King's Bridge Road
- The City was reviewing the existing traffic operations, circulation, and restrictions in the area to determine if changes could be made to improve network connectivity.
- An important part of this review process was to get feedback from residents in the area and people who travel through the area on some possible changes that may be explored further.

Purpose of the engagement

- Councillors Debbie Hanlon (Lead, Transportation), Ian Froude (Ward 4) and Sandy Hickman, Councillor at Large attended one of the in-person sessions;
- City of St. John's Transportation Engineering Manager, Garrett Donaher; City of St. John's Transportation Engineer, Anna Bauditz; City of St. John's Manager, Organizational Performance and Strategy, Victoria Etchegary attended the in-person sessions and monitored online engagement
- About 40 people, primarily from the immediate neighbourhood, attended the in-person sessions.
- There were 1500 visits to engagestjohns.ca project page, 482 valid surveys were completed, 23 comments submitted to engage, 1 e-mail sent to engage@stjohns.ca.

Who participated in the engagement process?

Engagement process

Visuals of the proposed changes were provided both online and at the in-person sessions.

Residents were asked to indicate if they liked the proposed change, did not like it or were indifferent to it.

All engagement methods (in-person and online) used the same questions to solicit feedback.


The engagement opportunity was promoted through all of the City's regular communications channels and road signage was placed in the area advising of the in-person sessions more than one week in advance.


Residents were informed that the proposed changes were all concepts at this time, no decisions had been made, and there had been no budget earmarked for any of the proposed capital improvements.


They were informed that a full report with recommendations would be submitted to Council in the coming weeks.


Note: just over half of those who completed the survey live in the area










Feedback from the in-person sessions

- Generally good support for a sidewalk on Circular Rd.
- Views were mixed on the other options with some strongly favouring the proposed changes and some strongly favouring the current state or some other option.
- Other issues such as speeding on Empire Avenue, and traffic signals on King's Bridge and Empire Ave. were also mentioned at the session.

Comments and e-mails received

- Concerns with some of the options proposed as they related to slippery conditions, speeding, roundabout, general safety, lights
- Concerns with unintended consequences of the current no entry on Winter –traffic being moved to neighbouring streets or making it inconvenient for people on or near the street to get around
- Comments and concerns with making any change to the proposed no –entry on Winter Avenue.
